FIRST TENNESSEE RECORD OF ANCIENT MURRELET

On Friday, 24 November 2023 my wife Patti and I were birding along the South Chickamauga Creek Greenway in Hamilton County. We decided to continue to Chickamauga Dam where an Eared Grebe (*Podiceps nigricollis*) had been seen recently. When we arrived at the day use area above the dam at 1230 we noticed an immature Bald Eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*) hunting along the shoreline, flying back and forth near the boat ramp. As we approached for a better look, the eagle flew off. We then scanned the lake's surface and saw an unfamiliar bird pop up about 20 meters away. I had seen only pictures of something similar in field guides, so I asked Patti to Google Auks. She looked at the photographs and said the bird was an Ancient Murrelet (*Synthliboramphus antiquus*), a bird of the north Pacific coast. I agreed and immediately called fellow birder Kevin Calhoun to ask him to come verify this. After describing the bird and its behavior, he agreed it could be an Ancient Murrelet and said he could be there in 10 minutes.

As we waited, we became concerned when the bird flew out to the middle of the lake and dove out of sight. I got out my spotting scope, and my friend Kent Pennington arrived with his. We saw the bird pop up briefly and then dive again. Other birders began arriving as Kevin showed up with his camera. We were all looking north towards the dam when Patti spotted the bird again near the inlet of the marina. Kevin was able to take several pictures, and after examining them said the bird was an Ancient Murrelet (Figure 1).

We posted the bird on eBird and Telegram. As more observers arrived, we were thrilled to observe the bird's repeating pattern of behavior. It would fly to the middle of the lake, dive under water and "herd" minnows back to the shallows of the marina where it would feast on them (Figure 2).

This behavior continued during the next eight days that the bird was present and reported by many birders from as far away as Texas and Delaware.

This sighting was accepted by the Tennessee Bird Records Committee as the first record of the Ancient Murrelet in Tennessee (Gerdeman 2023).

ROUND TABLE NOTE

SOUTHEASTERN AVIAN RESEARCH BANDING REPORT – 2023 - Southeastern Avian Research has completed its ninth Ruby-throated Hummingbird banding season in Tennessee. We traveled approximately 3,600 miles and spent over two hundred hours in the field with a field crew of fourteen volunteers and numerous hosts at locations statewide. With this effort, we banded 1,917 Ruby-throated hummingbirds at 18 locations between 8 June and 23 September 2023, including repeat visits to 7 locations. We go to multiple private homes twice in the season, and productive sites such as the South Welcome Station at Land Between the Lakes we visited four times.

We recaptured 317 return Ruby-throated Hummingbirds from previous years, including six-year-old females (3), five-year old females (3), four-year old females (5) and three-year-old hummingbirds, both male and female (20). We recaptured our own birds at various locations allowing us to measure distance, time, and direction in real time. One Female banded at the Woodlands Nature Station at Land Between the Lakes was recaught three weeks later in July at the South Welcome Center, a distance of about 35 miles. A female we banded in Tennessee as a hatch year bird in 2020 was recaptured in 2023 in central Illinois.

During the winter months we traveled, banded, and reconfirmed nine western winter hummingbirds (8 Rufous and 1 Allen's) including a third-year return female Rufous Hummingbird in Nashville.

A significant portion of our work includes outreach and education. We attended and did banding demonstrations at six hummingbird festivals this summer in Tennessee and Kentucky, including a banding trip to The Nature Station at Land Between the Lakes for their Hummingbird Event. I did seven hummingbird programs from middle Tennessee to Memphis for interested garden clubs, bird groups and Assisted Living residents. We offered a private banding session for the third year at the Helping Hands auction, which helps the Tennessee National Wildlife Refuge Friends Group raise funds to provide transportation to the Refuge for environmental education for local schoolchildren.

All banding records have been turned in to reporting agencies and new bands have been ordered and have already arrived for next season.

THE 2023 TENNESSEE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT SUMMARY

Ron Hoff Loudon, Tennessee

The 2023 Tennessee Christmas Bird Count (CBC) was the 80th consecutive compilation since it began in 1930 and the 93rd overall, as no count was made in 1943. Twenty-nine counts reported data this season representing 169 species plus 18 count week species, the most species ever recorded for the Tennessee CBC summary. The weather across the state was average for the season, but nine counties experienced high winds. Temperatures ranged from a wintery 18° in Shady Valley/Mountain City and Great Smoky Mountains National Park to a more comfortable 69° in Perry County.

Limpkin, Black-bellied Plover, and Western Flycatcher were all new species. Other highlights included Mute Swan, Long-tailed Duck, Ruffed Grouse, Eared Grebe, Red-throated Loon, Anhinga, Neotropic Cormorant, Rough-legged Hawk, 8 species of owls, White-eyed Vireo, Wood Thrush, Harris's Sparrow, Yellow-breasted Chat, Black-and-white Warbler, and Indigo Bunting.

The following species were recorded in record or notably high numbers: American Wigeon, Green-winged Teal, Common Goldeneye, Common Merganser, Sora, Wilson's Snipe, Greater Yellowlegs, Bonaparte's Gull, Lesser Black-backed Gull, Forster's Tern, Double-crested Cormorant, American White Pelican, Barn Owl, Burrowing Owl, Short-eared Owl, Northern Saw-whet Owl, Red-bellied Woodpecker, Merlin, Eastern Phoebe, Carolina Chickadee, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Golden-crowned Kinglet, Brown Creeper, Winter Wren, Brown Thrasher, Hermit Thrush, Le Conte's Sparrow, Savannah Sparrow, Orange-crowned Warbler, and Pine Warbler. Record low or notable low numbers were recorded for Canada Goose, American Black Duck, Wild Turkey, Black-crowned Night-Heron, Blue Jay, and Northern Cardinal.

Ross's Goose: Sumner Co (3) Cage's Bend Campground, Old Hickory Lake, 18 Nov (ph, TLo); and Shelby Co (1) Mud Island (CR) on the same day, ers.

Cackling Goose: Williamson Co (1) Ward Circle Pond, Brentwood, 29 Nov (ph, JA) was confirmed to be of the *minima* subspecies. It is the first to be photo documented in Tennessee and one of a small handful of confirmed records in the eastern US.

Tundra Swan: Sullivan Co (24) Musicks Campground, South Holston Lake, 10 Nov (RLK, ph, SQ, m.ob.) second highest fall record since 1978.

Gadwall: Shelby Co (1013) Riverport Rd Sloughs, 10 Nov, max (CRu).

Redhead: Davidson Co (30) J. Percy Priest Lake, Seven Points Campground, 19 Nov, max (RMG, WL) notable high count.

Ring-necked Duck: Henry Co (3000) Springville, 10 Nov, max (RS).

There were good numbers of all three scoter species this fall. One notable report from Cook Recreation Area in Davidson Co had all three species in one location on 11 Nov (DR).



THE WINTER SEASON

1 December - 29 February 2024

Winter started out warm and dry with daily temperatures in December ranging from $1-4\,^\circ\mathrm{F}$ above average throughout the state and some degree of drought conditions in most counties. The majority of West and Middle TN ended the year in severe drought. The main weather event of the season was an arctic air blast in January which sent the state plummeting to sub-zero temperatures and brought heavy precipitation. Thirty-one daily cold records were broken and 61 weather stations reported daily record snow depth measurements. Stations in Williamson and Hamblen counties recorded all their all-time record snow depth measurements. By the end of the month, temperatures were back above average. February was $1-6\,^\circ\mathrm{F}$ above average across the state with heavy rain in the first half of the month but ending with drier conditions. [1]

Rarities this season included the first state record ANCIENT MURRELET and second record WESTERN FLYCATCHER. It was a good winter for the rarer gulls and loons, and a weak to average year for irruptive finches.

Sightings are extracted from eBird [2], submissions from regional compilers, the tn-birds listserv, and when necessary, verified social media posts. Comments on historical records rely on Birds of Tennessee - A New Annotated Checklist [3], archives of the tn-birds listserv as well as subsequent eBird records and submissions to the Tennessee Bird Records Committee (TBRC).

Horned Grebe: Davidson Co (434) J. Percy Priest Lake, Seven Points Campground, 30 Jan, max (FF) notable.

Red-Necked Grebe: Davidson Co (1) J. Percy Priest Lake, Seven Points Picnic Area, 22 Feb (ph, AT).

Eared Grebe: Davidson Co (1–2) J. Percy Priest Lake from 26 Dec (ph, FF, MJ) last reported 29 Feb (ph, GG).

White-winged Dove: Blount Co (1) coming to a feeding station, Kettering Road, 30 Jan–29 Feb (ph, SGr, m.ob.).

LIMPKIN: Many continued from fall, with 13 counties reporting sightings this season (down from 24 in the Fall Season). Several of these continued into spring. Of particular note is a record high (24) in Humphreys Co, 23 Dec, max (RS) exceeding last fall's record of 20. This appears to represent the highest inland North American record for the species. West TN: Fayette Co (1) Ghost River, Moscow, 16 Dec (ph, DMs); Henderson Co (1) Dogwood Lake, 11 Dec (ph, BB); Lake Co (2) Black Bayou Refuge-Wheelchair Hunting Area, 16 Dec (ph, AF, DR, CAS); Shelby Co (1) Meeman-Shelby Forest SP, 14 Jan (ph, WN); Benton Co (3) Duck River Bottoms Overlook, 14 Jan (RS), and (1) Beaver Dam Creek, 28 Jan (ph, SBr). Middle TN: Humphreys Co, reports of 1–24 (noted above) continuing birds into spring; Davidson Co (1) continuing at Centennial Park, Nashville, last seen 3 Dec (MS); Perry Co (4) Lick Creek Embayment, 21 Dec (VS); Maury Co (1) continuing at Big Oak Lake, Spring Hill, last reported 23 Jan (ph, HD); Warren Co (1) continuing along Barren Fork River, last reported 22 Dec (MkE). Lesser Yellowlegs: Lake Co (21/14) Choctaw Fields North, 31 Jan/4 Feb (ph, MAG, WGC fide MAG) were likely very early spring migrants. Humphreys Co (2) DRU, 18 Feb (AJT) were also early.

Greater Yellowlegs: Reported from 11 counties. Lake Co (25) Tiptonville Ferry Rd, 16 Dec (ph, MAG, CVN, RH) perhaps late fall migrants.

Pectoral Sandpiper: Blount Co (3) early arrivals at Lackey Creek, with one bird 27 Feb (TH) joined by two more, 29 Feb (TH); Humphreys Co (1) DRU, 28 Feb (DF).

ANCIENT MURRELET: Hamilton Co (1) first state record found by Tim L. Russell, Chickamauga Dam Day Use Area, 24 Nov, last reported 3 Dec (ph, TLR, m.ob.).

Single birds also reported in the county at Nathan Bedford Forrest SP, 6 Feb (RS) and Camden WMA, 9 Feb (AT) likely the same individuals from the landfill. Rutherford Co (1–2) Rutherford Co Landfill, 17–24 Jan (ph, JWa, m.ob.); Davidson Co (1) J. American White Pelican: reported in 31 counties from all regions except the Cumberland Plateau. Carter Co (12) Watauga Lake, Cherokee National Forest,16 Dec (ph, AO) rare sighting in the high eastern mountains and an apparent first county record. Hamilton Co (720) Chickamauga Lake, 29 Dec, max (JF).

American Bittern: Hamilton Co (1) Standifer Gap Marsh, 25–31 Jan (ph, WJ, KP).

Black-crowned Night-Heron: wintering birds reported from 12 counties. Meigs Co (21) Watts Bar Landing,19 Feb, max (RSh, DSh).

Cliff Swallow: Hamilton Co (2) Brainerd Levee, 28 Feb, ers (BD); and (2) Renaissance Park, 29 Feb (LS).

Blue-gray Gnatcatcher: Hamilton Co (1) Amnicola Marsh, 5 Dec–8 Jan (BD, ph, KD, m.ob.); Meigs Co (1) Hiwassee Refuge, 3 Jan (GM); Knox Co (1) Maloney Rd Park, 28 Dec (PRk); Humphreys Co (1) DRU, 9 Dec (ph, AT, RS); Shelby Co (1) Overton Park, 11 Dec (ph, MMc).

Sedge Wren: Hamilton Co (1) Baylor School, 23 Dec (ph, WJo) and (2) 26 Dec (LT, WJo); (1) Standifer Gap Marsh, 30 Jan (AY); Henry Co (1) Haggler Ridge Rd, 17 Dec (RS, LP); Humphreys Co (2) DRU, 23 Dec (VS); Madison Co (1) Middle Fork Bottoms SP, 9/22 Dec (ph, AJT); Hardin Co (1) Walker Branch SNA, 27 Dec (AJT); Lake Co (1) Tumbleweed WMA, 16 Dec (CRu, RS, LP); Shelby Co (1) Shelby Farms Park, 22 Dec–3 Feb (SD, CVN, m.ob.).

Marsh Wren: Shelby Co (12) Ensley, 17 Dec, max (ph, CRu, m.ob.); Humphreys Co (5) DRU, and (5) Painted Rock Road, 23 Dec (AT); Hardin Co (4) Walker Branch SNA, 27 Dec (AJT); Hamilton Co (5) Baylor School, 16 Dec (ph, LT, AY). Single birds also reported from Johnson, Blount, Carroll, Lake, and Fayette Cos.

Wood Thrush: Davidson Co (1) Radnor Lake SP, 1–15 Dec (ph, MB, m.ob.); Shelby Co (1) T.O. Fuller SP, 17 Dec (au. CRu, JV, m.ob.) rare winter records.

Evening Grosbeak: Sevier Co (1) adult male at a private feeder, 22 Dec (ph, HMc).

Red Crossbill: Benton Co (12) Coxburg Rd, 23 Dec-14 Jan (DR, au, ph, VS, RS) extraordinary find for mid-state.

Pine Siskin: Generally scarce in most of the state, with only scattered reports west of the mountains. Blount Co (700) private home, 4 Feb, max (ph, KBa, TE).

Lapland Longspur: Lake Co (570) Jolly Landing, 21 Jan, max (AT, VS, RS).

American Tree Sparrow: Knox Co (1) Forks of the River WMA, 19 Dec (KL), and Cumberland Co (1) 21 Jan (JY) uncommon for eastern half of the state. Benton Co (1) Camden, 11 Dec (SF), and near Halladay 23 Dec / 14 Jan (DR, AT); Henry Co (1) at a home near Paris, 22 Dec/22 Jan (RWh); Madison Co (1) Jackson, 18 Jan (MJT); Dyer Co (1) Bogota WMA, 21 Jan (AT, VS, RS).

Harris's Sparrow: Davidson Co (1) juvenile, Bells Bend Park, 21 Dec–9 Feb (ph, GG, FF, m.ob.); Perry Co (1) juvenile, Lick Creek Farm, 24 Dec–21 Feb (ph, AT, m.ob.).

Spotted Towhee: Hamilton Co (1) Baylor School, 23 Dec–30 Jan (ph, WJo, m.ob.) first record for southern area of Ridge and Valley region.

Yellow-headed Blackbird: Blount Co (1) Alcoa, 17 Jan (ph, SGr, m.ob.); Humphreys Co (1) DRU, 18 Jan (ph, RS, VS, AT).

Western Meadowlark: Humphreys Co (1) DRU, 27 Jan (ph, DR, RS) continued into February with (2) reported 9/17/23 Feb (AT, AF, RS, CRu); Gibson Co (1) Buck Wade Loop, 1/3 Jan (au, GS, MAG) and (1) Trenton, 15 Feb (MAG); Lake Co (1–3) Vaughn Rd Fields, 16–24 Dec (ph, MAG, RH, m.ob.), and (2) Tumbleweed WMA , 10 Feb (ph, DR); Obion Co (4) Reelfoot NWR, Visitor Center, 23 Feb max (au, AO, JS).

Baltimore Oriole: Hamilton Co (1) Chattanooga, 22 Dec (WJo); Moore Co (1) Lynchburg, visiting a feeder, 15 Jan (SDo) had reportedly been seen for a couple of weeks prior; David-

son Co (1) photographed at a feeder 1 Feb (ph, EHa) had also reportedly been present for "several weeks."

Brewer's Blackbird: Davidson Co (1) Tyne Blvd, 10 Feb (MB) uncommon sighting in Nashville; Perry Co (1) Stoll farm, 24 Jan (RS); Humphreys Co (9) DRU, 27 Jan (ph, DR, RS), and (1) Cherry Bottoms, 23 Dec (RS); Decatur Co (11) Halladay, 26 Jan (ph, CA); Lake Co (11) Tumbleweed WMA, 1 Dec (RS) max of multiple reports in the county; Shelby Co (11) Shelby Farms Park, 28 Jan (ph, SD, CRu).

Common Grackle: Wilson Co (10,400) Vine, 29 Jan max of this common, yet rapidly declining species (JN, RN). National attention has recently turned to the decline of the Common Grackle. Birders in the field are encouraged to submit careful counts of flocks to help document their population.

Ovenbird: Hamilton Co (1) Booker T. Washington SP, 16 Jan (ph, TRu) rare winter report.

Northern Waterthrush: Marion Co (1) Nickajack Lake–Shellmound Boat Ramp, 13/18 Jan (ph, TL); Rutherford Co (1) Murfree Spring Wetlands, 1-20 Dec (ph, CS).

Black-and-White Warbler: Davidson Co (1) Warner Parks Gin Barn Field, 16 Dec (APa, m.ob.); Hamilton Co (1) Amnicola Marsh, 5 Dec/13 Jan (KZ, LE).

Common Yellowthroat: Rhea Co (1) Yuchi WMA, 27 Dec (PN); Rutherford Co (1) Murfree Spring Wetlands, 20 Dec–14 Jan (ph, JW, m.ob.); Lincoln Co (1) Coral Ridge, 11 Feb (JB); Humphreys Co (1) DRU, 23 Dec (VS); Madison Co (2) South Fork Refuge, max 1 Jan (AT); Obion Co (1) Reelfoot NWR–Grassy Island Unit, 16 Dec (ph, PH, m.ob); Lake Co (1) Tiptonville, 16 Dec (MAG).

Cape May Warbler: Hamilton Co (1) Moccasin Bend, 29 Jan (BBu).

Palm Warbler: Polk Co (24) East Tennessee Nursery, 19 Dec, max (AY) notable high count. S

Prairie Warbler: Lincoln Co (1) Coral Ridge, 11 Dec (ph, JB); Knox Co (1) Seven Islands Bird Park, 24–28 Dec (ph, GG, m.ob.).

Rose-breasted Grosbeak: Fentress Co (1) Vine, adult male at feeder, 5 Dec (ph, RY); Benton Co (1) Beaver Dam Creek, apparent hatch-year male at feeder, 22 Jan–14 Feb (ph, SBr).

BLACK-HEADED GROSBEAK: Davidson Co (1) Brentwood, female or hatch-year male at feeder, 22 Dec-15 Jan (ph, MJ, m.ob.), third county record and the first in 40 years. There are fewer than 30 state records.

Indigo Bunting: Humphreys Co (1) DRU, 23 Dec (VS); Davidson Co (1) Old Hickory Dam, 1 Jan (MS, GG, TLo) and (1) wintering bird at the home of this author was observed coming to a feeder 12–20 Jan (ph, GG).

Beginning with the publication of this issue, March 2024, Volume 95, No. 1, The Migrant will move to a fully digital format. The current issue and the three issues preceding it will now be available to both members and non-members on the TOS website (www.tnbirds. org). Notification will be made on tn-birds when a new issue is published. Past issues are available at SORA (Searchable Ornithological Research Archives), but only through Volume 92, No. 1, March 2021. In the future The Migrant will be available online at South Florida University, but the conversion is not complete at this date.

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

The Migrant records observations and studies of birds in Tennessee and adjacent areas.

SUBMISSIONS: The manuscript should be submitted electronically to Bob Ford at editorthemigrant@gmail.com. Submission of hard copies is optional. If so desired the original and two copies of the manuscript should be sent to the: Editor: Bob Ford, 808 Hatchie, Brownsville, TN 38012. Manuscripts that have been published in other journals should not be submitted.

MATERIAL: The subject matter should relate to some phase of Tennessee ornithology. It should be original, factual, concise and scientifically accurate.

STYLE: Both articles and short notes are solicited; recent issues of *The Migrant* should be used as a guide in the preparation of manuscripts.

COPY: Manuscripts should be double-spaced with adequate margins for editorial notations and emailed in Word.docx. Tables and figures should be prepared in a separate file with appropriate headings. For photographs intended for publication, 72 – 100 dpi is acceptable. Weights, measurements, and distances should be in metric units. Dates should be in "continental" form (e.g., 16 March 1997). Use the 24-hour clock (e.g., 0500 or 1900).

NOMENCLATURE: The scientific name of a species should be given after the first use of the full common name in the text. The scientific name should be italicized and in parentheses. Names should follow the A. O. S. Check-list of North American Birds.

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific and descriptive.

ABSTRACT: Manuscripts of five or more pages should include an abstract. The abstract should be less then 5% of the length of the manuscript. It should include a brief explanation of why the research was done, the major results, and why the results are important.

LITERATURE CITED: List all literature citations in a "Literature Cited" section at the end of the text. Text citations should include the author and year.

IDENTIFICATION: Manuscripts including reports of rare or unusual species or of species at atypical times should include: date and time, light and weather conditions, exact location, habitat, optical equipment, distance, behavior of bird, comparison with other similar species, characteristic markings, experience of observer, other observers verifying the identification and reference works consulted.

SEASON REPORTS: Observations that are to be considered for publication in "The Season" should be emailed to the Season Editor, Graham Gerdeman, at grahamgerdeman@gmail.com.
