

Field Trip Report: Club Co-Hosts Birding Outing With Crabtree Farms To Attract New Members



October 16, 2021—in attendance were approximately 25 new birders.

Club member Barbara Johnson recently hosted a bird walk at Crabtree Farms with the goal of promoting the club among potential new members.

The event was promoted as open for beginners of all ages. The club even had several pairs of binoculars that it loaned out to participants that didn't own a pair. Participants walked around Crabtree Farms observing different species including fall migrants.

The best part about co-hosting this event with Crabtree Farms is they help promote the event which gave the event and club greater exposure. This model was a huge success and hopefully we will see some of the beginner participants join the club and attend future events.

MORE FIELD TRIPS OUTSIDE OF THE CHATTANOOGA-AREA?

This past year Chattanooga TOS held two field trips outside of the Chattanooga-area. Specifically, we held a field trip to bird the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, and Hinch Mountain. Both of these trips were a huge success.

A Black-legged Kittiwake was observed by Rubin Stoll at Duck River Unit, in Humphreys County on October 28. It was chased away by gulls, in the direction of the pump house, and wasn't relocated.

A **Cave Swallow** was located by Daniel Jacobson, at **Chester Frost Park** in **Hamilton County**. The bird was observed associating with Tree Swallows and Barn Swallows for approximately 15 minutes before it flew off.

A **Limipkin** was located by Iris Kilpatrick at Duck River Unit, in **Humphreys County**, on October 25. This is the 5th state record. The bird was still present as of the date this newsletter was published. Please check out our website for a full article on this bird, including how to get to the observation location.

The **Burrowing Owl**, located in **Humphreys County**, in April has returned, as of October 24. Last spring the owl could be observed with a scope from the dirt mound across Herbert Road from the site, but cannot currently be seen due to leaf cover. Hopefully, it will remain long enough for the fall leaves to drop from the trees.

Tennessee Rare Bird

Reports Continued

A deceased **female Painted Bunting** was found in **Hamilton County**, on Oct. 20. The bird was a victim of a window strike.

A **Say's Phoebe** was observed by Justine Nation on October 19, in **Wilson County**. It was chased away by a Cooper's Hawk shortly after being discovered.

A Fulvous Whistling-Duck has taken up residence at Ensley Bottoms in Shelby County. It has been associating with the resident Black-bellied Whistling Ducks. The most recent report took place on October 17th.

A **Rufus Hummingbird** was photographed in **Hamilton County**, October 14th, but departed that same day.

A **Townsend's Solitaire** was photographed ion **Clingman's Dome**, on October 11th, and continued for two days, moving between **Sevier County**, TN and Swain County, NC. This appears to be the 1st Sevier County record.

A Black-legged Kittiwake was photographed by Shane Williams at Concord Park In Knox County, on September 28. The bird continued for one day. This appears to be the first County Record for this species.

After a local farmer left a bowl of eggs on Joe Hutto's front porch, his life was forever changed. Hutto, possessing a broad background in the natural sciences and an interest in imprinting young animals, incubated the eggs and waited for them to hatch. As the chicks emerged from their shells, they locked eyes with an unusual but dedicated mother.

Deep in the wilds of Florida's Flatlands, Hutto spent each day living as a turkey mother, taking on the full-time job of raising sixteen turkey chicks. Hutto dutifully cared for his family around the clock, roosting with them, taking them foraging, and immersing himself in their world. In the process, they revealed their charming curiosity and surprising intellect. There was little he could teach them that they did not already know, but he showed them the lay of the land and protected them from the dangers of the forest as best he could. In return, they taught him how to see the world through their eyes.
