Who: Organizer, Jeffrey Schaarschmidt. This program is open to anyone who wishes to participate. What: Birding and Butterflying weekend in the Great Smoky Mountains.

**Where:** The Great Smoky

Mountains.

When: May 21, 2020 at Noon until

May 23, 2020 at Noon.

**Why:** To enjoy all that nature and the Great Smoky Mountains has to offer.

\* Please note: May temperatures range between 39 and 57 degrees on Climgman's Dome, and between 61 and 80 degrees in Cades Cove. So, it is suggested that you pack a jacket.

Event details: weather permitting! Please feel free to participate in as many or as few events as you wish. However, it may be impossible to contact and meet up with the group once they are out birding or butterflying, as mobile phone service in the park is extremely limited.

*Friday:* Jeffrey will be leaving to go to the Great Smoky Mountains for a weekend of birding and butterflying. He will be leaving Chattanooga on Friday at noon. Participants can either meet up with Jeffrey in the parking lot of the REI store near Hamilton Place Mall, located at 2507 Lifestyle Way, Chattanooga, TN 37421, or meet him in the Great Smoky Mountains park. Friday will be primarily devoted to butterflying in the Great Smoky Mountains, with a focus on finding Silvery Blues and other species that are difficult to find elsewhere in east Tennessee.

Participants should be sure to pack snacks and water, as we will be eating a late dinner in Gatlinburg, most likely at the Smoky Mountain Brewery, which serves pizza, burgers, chicken, steaks, and an assortment of adult beverages. After dinner we will be switching to birding mode with the hopes of locating **Saw Whet Owls and other owls** in the Tennessee portion of the park. Following this, participants will retire for the night at a campsite or hotel of their choice.

Saturday: Full day of birding!
Participants will meet about 7:00
a.m. in the Newfound Gap parking
lot. We will have two morning
targets, specifically **Grouse and Red Crossbills**. The goal will be to
check out a few areas where the
species have been most often
observed.

Following this will go up towards the top of Clingman's Dome to search for Least Flycatchers, Ravens, Black-capped Chickadees, Red-breasted Nuthatches, Blue-headed Verios and any other species. We will take a lunch break and then head out to bird in Cades Cove. After a late dinner, we will again attempt to locate Saw Whet Owls and other owls. Following this, participants will retire for the night at a campsite or hotel of their choice. It is suggested that all participants pack snacks and water.

Sunday: This day's schedule will vary depending on whether we were able to locate **Grouse** and **Red Crossbills** on Saturday. If we missed *either* species, we will meet for another attempt about 7:00 a.m., and then transition to butterflying for the remainder of the day. If we were successful for BOTH species on Saturday, we will meet at 9:00 am, at a place to be determined, and will devote the entire day to butterflying in the park. It is suggested that all participants pack snacks and water.

April 29 Hamilton County, TN I caught 2 first-of-season thrushes while banding a Greenway Farm this morning; 2 Veerys and a Graycheeked Thrush. I also caught a Wood Thrush and 2 White-eved Vireos. Given the Birdcast and radar images from a couple of days ago, I was expecting a lot of activity yesterday and today, but it was quiet.
