Bird Flu Infections On Rise: 8 Cases Reported In TN

Bird flu infections have expanded to three additional states since we published our last news-letter. There are currently 30 states that have confirmed cases of bird flu, including 8 cases in Tennessee.

Songbirds are not generally affected by the bird flu, according to the USDA. Most of the outbreaks nationwide are in farm raised populations of chickens and turkeys, but there has been increasing in the number of waterfowl and bald eagles.

Bird flu has been blamed for the deaths of Bald Eagles in 14 states.

Experts have suggested that people remove their bird feeders in areas where bird flu has been detected. Many infected birds shed the flu through feces and respiratory secretions, and it usually survives in cool, damp environments.

TN Rare Bird Reports

Seven **Glossy Ibis** were reported at the Sod Farm in **Coffee County** on April 26.

A Lark Sparrow was reported in pond 5 at Cross
Creek NWA in Steward County, on April 25.

A **Bronzed Cowbird** was reported in **Shelby County** on April 22.

A **Glossy Ibis** was photographed in a small pond in **Coffee County**, on April 22.

A Marbled Godwit was located in Pool 5 at Duck River Unit in Humphreys County, April 16. The observer also had a flyover Neotropic Cormorant at the same location.

An **Anhinga** was observed, flying over Fuller Road, in **Gibson County** on April 12.

A Black-Headed Grosbeak was observed and photographed in Red Bank, in Hamilton County, on April 10.

An **Cinnamon Teal** was observed at Duck River Unit, in **Humphrey's County**, on April 8.

An **Upland Sandpiper** was observed in **Hamilton County**, on April 5.

A White-winged Scoter was observed in Hamilton County, on April 5.

An **Swainson's Hawk** was observed at Duck River Unit, in **Humphrey's County**, on April 2.
