

NOVEMBER PROGRAM

The November program was presented by MTOS member Ryan Pudwell. Ryan is President of the Nonconnah Creek Conservancy. The Conservancy's mission is to: (1) advocate for conservation of natural spaces along Nonconnah Creek and in its watershed, (2) educate people about natural and cultural resources found along the creek, (3) improve the recreational value of the creek for today and for future generations.

Ryan leads nature walks for the Wolf River and Nonconnah Creek Conservancies. On these walks Ryan points out birds, plants, mammals, and reptiles as well as rocks, fossils, archeological sites, and artifacts. The Conservancy is surveying the biodiversity of Nonconnah Creek and its watershed with the Nonconnah 2023 Project. Ryan and other volunteers post to and collect data from iNaturalist, eBird and other sources to get a picture of the animals and plants within the watershed. Nonconnah Creek runs through the southern portion of Shelby County from Collierville to McKeller Lake. The creek was channelized to reduce flooding during the Great Depression. As a result, water rises dramatically in straightened sections during heavy rains. Nonconnah Creek is fed by surface water runoff and has a large watershed that includes much of the southern portion of the county. One unusual aspect of the creek is exposed gravel. Ryan showed agate and fossilized coral and wood that have been collected along the creek. He noted that an organic layer containing the remains of plants from the last ice age is evident along many of the creek banks.

The Conservancy was formed to protect a parcel of land called Christine's Woods in eastern Shelby County. These 160 acres of wetland, now known as the Dan Turley Natural Area, are protected with a conservation easement and home to the Nonconnah Greenbelt Park that runs from Forest Hill Irene Road to Hacks Cross Road. This wetland supports a heron rookery, large numbers of Wood Duck, Marbled Salamander, Leafy Blue Flag Iris, Woodland Spider Lily, Adders Tongue Fern, native viburnum, and Cottonmouth Snake. Ryan showed pictures of other areas along the creek where he leads nature walks. He brought a collection of arrowheads, fossils, agates, and toys that have been collected along the creek. Ryan is especially interested in cataloging the flora and fauna of Nonconnah Creek and its watershed and promoting recreational opportunities the creek provides. MEETING NOTES

Christmas Counts—Help Needed!

Sue Ferguson reported that the Raleigh area Memphis CBC group that she and her late husband have led for 40 years needs a new group leader and several younger participants. The group has been birding McCrary's Farm, Kennedy Park, the Epping Way portion of the Wolf River Greenway, and 3 small lakes (Windemere, Scenic Hills (Loch Neven), and Sky Lake). Cliff VanNostrand noted that he needs help with the Fayette Co. CBC. That count will be held on a Saturday (Dec. 23) so that more folks might be available to participate.

Field Trips

November 11. Shelby Farms

Twenty observers turned out to bird on a beautiful clear fall day. They recorded 65 bird species in the area north of Walnut Grove Rd. from Beaver Lake to the Gardens. Highlights included seven duck species including Green-winged Teal (8) and Canvasback (1), Greater Yellowlegs (4) Dunlin (1), Least Sandpiper (5), Northern Harrier (4), Sharp-shinned Hawk (1), Belted Kingfisher (3), Blue-headed Vireo (1), Winter Wren (1), Eastern Bluebird (16), Cedar Waxwing (8), Am. Goldfinch (12), Eastern Meadowlark (32), and nine species of sparrow including LeConte's (1), Savannah (44), Song (22), Lincoln's (1), and Swamp (4).

Unusual Bird Sightings

Short-eared Owls (4-9) are present in fields along Gardener Rd. near the community gardens. Watch for them from 4:30 pm till dark. First reported on Nov. 1.

Many less-common species of sparrow have been reported in fields near the Gardener Rd. marsh. These include Clay-colored Oct. 23, Henslow's Oct 29, Nelson's Oct. 28, LeConte's Nov. 21, Lincoln's Nov. 11, and Grasshopper Oct. 26.

Also at Shelby Farms: Franklin's Gull Nov. 17, Scissor-tailed Flycatcher Oct. 30, Red-necked Grebe Nov. 15, White-winged Scoter Nov. 15.

Knox Martin reported counting 84 Black Vultures feeding on dead catfish near Catch'em Lake at the Argicenter. Knox said that during the time that Shelby Farms was a penal farm that raised its own food, vultures were regularly killed, and that seemed to have kept the number of Black Vultures low in the area until recently.



Treasurer's Report

The balance in the treasury as of November 21, 2023 is \$13,495.57. This is the balance following a \$200 disbursement for bluebird box construction, per October 15 chapter approval. This balance also reflects costs of \$336.00 for Directory printing and \$140.91 for mailing. We reduced print costs from 2022.
