



APRIL PROGRAM

Cindi and Steve Routledge described a birding tour they and 7 other TOS members took in Costa Rica in February 2024. Cindi is the Secretary of TOS, does contract work studying birds for the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, and is the President of Southeastern Avian Research (SEAR). Steve is a SEAR board member and Treasurer. SEAR was established to promote conservation of hummingbirds and other neotropical migrants. Cindi

has banded 18,000 hummingbirds and was especially interested in seeing some of the many hummingbird species of Costa Rica. Costa Rica is popular as a site for birding and nature tours. The Central American country has many tropical microclimates and 6 active volcanos. A quarter of the land is protected as nature reserves.

The 16-day birding trip was led by guide Paco Madrigal and organized by Cotinga Tours. The group saw 424 bird species and prepared 122 bird checklists. Cindi added 79 birds to her life list. Cindi noted that Costa Rica has few endemic species because many bird species can also be seen in adjoining countries, especially Panama. Steve showed a map of Costa Rica and noted that the tour focused on the central and southwest portion of the

country including the Osa Peninsula. The trip began and ended at the hotel Bougainvillea near San Jose where they were able to explore a 10-acre botanical garden. They stayed at numerous lodges including Selva Verde Lodge and Drake Bay Wilderness Lodge. They visited a riparian zone, took a boat tour through a mangrove swamp, boated to Corcovado National Park, and viewed nesting sea birds on a rock in Corcovado Bay. They visited Las Cruces Biological Station, a





protected forest fragment with many palms and endangered plant species. The group observed a wide variety of birds including owls, nightjars, hawks, woodpeckers, antshrikes, woodcreepers, tanagers, Crested Guan, Great Curassow, Yellow-throated Toucan, Northern Emerald Toucanet, Fiery-billed Aracari, Great Tinamou, Scarlet Macaw, and the endangered Great Green Macaw. The group also enjoyed seeing animals such as colorful poison dart

frogs, lizards, tent bats, tapir, tayra (a large member of the weasel family), coati and 3 monkey species.

Cindi's favorite bird sighting of the trip was the Fiery-throated Hummingbird. When seen in good light this hummingbird combines every color of the rainbow on its throat and breast. Seeing it made up for failure to see the Resplendent Quetzal.

Treasurer's Report

As of April 22, 2025 the balance in the Treasury is 14,411.85. This is the balance after recording the below April expenditures. The Treasurer continues to receive 2025 membership renewals; another handful is expected by May 31.

New Business

Two expenditures were voted on and approved at the April 16 chapter meeting. The chapter approved a \$600 Honorarium to St. George's Episcopal Church for provision of meeting space. The chapter also approved a \$750 Donation to veterinarian Dr. Felicia Knightly of the Memphis Zoo for procurement of an ophthalmoscope, for use with raptors. In 2024 Dr. Knightly and staff cared for over fifty raptors; fifteen have been helped so far in 2025.

A \$300 conservation donation was made to the Southeastern Avian Research 501(c)(3), as thanks to our April program speaker, Cyndi Routledge, and in lieu of travel and lodging cost reimbursement.
