GROUND NESTING CATTLE EGRETS, GREAT EGRETS, AND SNOWY EGRETS ON LITTLE ELDER ISLAND, WOODS RESERVOIR, FRANKLIN COUNTY

I conducted annual surveys of the rookery on Little Elder Island on Woods Reservoir in Franklin County from 2009-2014 as part of a project with Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency to monitor rookeries across the state. Little Elder Island is unique in its distant proximity to other known rookeries in the state, and up to seven species of waterbird species have nested simultaneously on the island. The vegetation on the island declined dramatically from 2011-2012, with near complete mortality of trees on the island by 2013. This change is likely a result of a large influx of nesting and loafing Double-crested Cormorants (*Phalacrocorax auritus*), which deposit large volumes of waste and can cause mortality of trees and shrubs in only a couple years (pers. obs. of islands on Old Hickory Lake). As a result, the number individuals per species nesting on the island has changed greatly.

On 21 May 2013, I conducted my annual survey of the nesting birds of Little Elder Island via kayak. With extensive tree mortality and loss of standing dead trees since 2012, the usual sites occupied by nesting waterbirds were drastically different from previous years. I observed at least a dozen pairs of ground nesting Cattle Egret (*Bubulcus ibis*) for the first time on the island; many nests were only a couple inches above the water line of the reservoir. This appears to be the first record of ground nesting Cattle Egret in the state (Figure 1).

On 3 June 2014, I again conducted my annual survey by kayak and counted at least 74 Cattle Egret nests on the ground on the island. I also documented six Great Egret (*Ardea alba*) nests and one Snowy Egret (*Egretta thula*) nest on the ground. Ground nesting Great and Snowy Egret was a new observation for the island and was something I had not previously observed. Cattle Egret, along with Great Blue Heron (*Ardea herodias*), Little Blue Heron (*Egretta caerulea*), and Black-crowned Night-heron (*Nycticorax nyticorax*) have been

previously documented nesting on branches laid horizontally on the adjacent duck blind, but I had not previously observed any Great or Snowy Egret nests on the ground on the island. In addition to ground nesting egrets, a Double-crested Cormorant nest was also documented for the first time nesting on the ground on the island.




Figure 2. A Great Egret adult attacks a Double-crested Cormorant chick in an adjacent nest on Little Elder Island, Woods Reservoir, Franklin County.

Unfortunately, I was unable to revisit the island in subsequent weeks in 2013 or 2014 to try to assess nesting success of the nests on the ground. The nests were mere inches above the water level of the reservoir and were very susceptible to flooding. Survival of nestlings on the ground is also unknown with numerous aggressive Great Egrets on the island. I observed one nesting adult Great Egret attacking a cormorant chick in an adjacent nest (Figure 2). Recent fledglings could be also susceptible to being chased into the water by larger flightless fledglings or adults, resulting in possibly mortality either by drowning or hypothermia.

The observations of ground nesting Cattle Egrets in 2013 and Great and Snowy Egrets and

Double-crested Cormorants on Little Elder Island in 2014 appear to be the first observations of this behavior in Tennessee. Cattle Egrets have been documented nesting on the ground in Texas (Telfair 2006). Telfair and Bister (2004) noted that Cattle Egret will nest on any site possible, even after most nest-site vegetation was killed by guanotrophy. Cattle Egret were also documented nesting in forks in limbs of trees and shrubs regardless of whether the plant was alive or dead, standing or collapsed. At one study site in Texas, 48% of nests were on or near the ground but mostly in proximity of collapsed vegetation (Telfair and Bister 2004). The observations of nest locations on horizontal downed branches and on the ground immediately next to vegetation were similarly observed at Little Elder Island.

Great Egrets are known to nest on the ground on islands devoid of vegetation, specifically islands in the Great Lakes dominated by Double-crested Cormorants (Gladstone 1979). Great Egrets were also noted nesting on manmade structures in Louisiana (McCrimmon et al. 2011), but occurrences of ground nesting Great Egrets are otherwise scarce. Snowy Egrets rarely nest on the ground, but this has been documented on Long Island, New York and in southern New Jersey (Salzman 1985, Parson and Master 2000). In contrast, Double-crested Cormorants are widely known to nest on the ground in large colonies on islands lacking nesting structures above the ground. Ground nesting by Cattle, Great and Snowy Egrets, and Double-crested Cormorants is generally rare to uncommon; the observations at Little Elder Island appear to be the first documentation of this phenomenon in Tennessee.

FIRST TENNESSEE RECORD OF GREAT KISKADEE

Late in the morning, close to noon, on 4 May 2018 I was birding in the general vicinity of O'Neal Lake at Hatchie National Wildlife Refuge in Haywood County. I was driving slowly when I heard a Willow Flycatcher (Empidonax traillii) singing. I stopped to observe the bird, and while I was stopped I put my spotting scope on the window mount and scanned the treetops and snags in the swampy area to the north looking for an Olive-sided Flycatcher (Contopus cooperi). I paused to look at a Great Crested Flycatcher (Myiarchus crinitus) in the top of a snag when another bird flew in and landed above it. I immediately recognized this bird as a Great Kiskadee (Pitangus sulphuratus), a bird which breeds throughout most of South and Central America and ranges northward into South Texas. I had excellent views in the scope of it perched for about 15 seconds. When I reached for my phone to get a digi-scoped photo, it flew. I followed it in the scope until I lost it behind some trees. I noted a big flycatcher, larger than the Great Crested Flycatcher that was perched just below it in the same tree, but smaller than a Northern Flicker (Colaptes auratus) that was also in the same tree. It was lemon yellow below, with bold black and white markings on the head, a white throat, and chestnut colored wings and tail. The first thing that I noticed about the bird was the large, boldly striped head and large bill. When I viewed the bird in flight, the chestnut in the wings was obvious. Observation was made with a Zeiss 85mm Diascope at 60x in good light at a distance of about 100 yards.

After the bird flew, I grabbed my binoculars and scope and ran towards the area where the bird had disappeared. I looked for several minutes but was unable to locate the bird. I contacted several other birders and was later joined by five additional observers. We searched for several hours without relocating the Great Kiskadee. The next day several birders and I again searched the refuge for the bird without success. One interesting note is that Hal Mitchell and Rob Harbin, upon arriving early that morning, heard a Northern Mockingbird (*Mimus polyglottos*) giving a perfect imitation of the Great Kiskadee's unique "KIS-ka-dee" calls.

This is the first Tennessee record for this species, pending acceptance by the Tennessee Bird Records Committee. While this species' range in the United States is generally limited to South Texas, a search in eBird shows records for it all over Texas, east as far as South Carolina (2 records), and north to Indiana, South Dakoda, and southern Ontario.

COOPER'S HAWK ATTACK ON A RING-BILLED GULL

On the morning of 19 February 2019 I arrived at the J. Percy Priest dam parking lot in Davidson County shortly after 0700. I spent about 20 minutes watching and photographing a distant Red-throated Loon (*Gavia stellata*). Finally, at one point I turned around and immediately saw a Ring-billed Gull (*Larus delawarensis*) near the middle of the road that goes through the parking lot. My immediate impression was that it seemed to be in a tussle as its wings were flapping. Expecting to see perhaps another gull fighting with it for food, my binoculars instead revealed a Cooper's Hawk (*Accipiter cooperii*), which had its talons into the gull, attempting to make the gull its food (Figure 1).

Cooper's Hawks usually prey on small to medium-sized birds that weigh between 30 and 130 grams, which is about 5-37% of the average mass of an adult eastern Cooper's Hawk male or 5-22% the mass of an adult female (Rosenfield et al 2019). In a southwestern Tennessee study, six Cooper's Hawks were radio-tracked during the nonbreeding season; forested habitats were used most frequently, followed by edge and open fields. The diet was dominated by birds, greater than 50% were passerines (Lake et al 2002). Typical prey includes species such as doves, jays, and starlings; mammals such as chipmunks and squirrels are also on their bill of fare.

The average body mass of a male eastern Cooper's Hawk is 338 grams, while a female eastern Cooper's Hawk average is 566 grams (Rosenfield et al 2019). By comparison, the average weight of a Ring-billed Gull is 497 grams (Steenhof 1983), which is 87% of an eastern adult female Cooper's Hawk body mass. Ring-billed Gull is certainly not its typical prey, although there is at least one other documented record of Cooper's Hawk predation on a gull in New York (see Rosenfield et al 2019). I quickly took several photos of the encounter.

The hawk was clearly intent on subduing the gull. At one point a school bus drove through the parking lot. As it approached the birds, I feared that the bus would cause the hawk to let go of the gull and fly off before I could get some closer pictures. However, even though the bus passed just a few yards from the two birds on the asphalt, the hawk stood its ground. Over the next few minutes the hawk struggled to move the hefty gull. Eventually, the Cooper's managed to shift its large prey onto the grass and slowly dragged it toward the woods, stopping from time to time to rest and pull out some feathers. During that time I was able to move closer to the birds and took additional photos of the conflict. By the time I left, there was no fight left in the gull (Figure 2).

I had missed the hawk's initial attack on the gull, and so afterward I wondered whether the hawk had caught the gull on the ground or attacked it in mid-air. While the latter would have been spectacular, I suspect that the former was more likely given the two birds' similar weights, and several of my photos show what appears to be some food in the parking lot where the gull's attention may have fatally wandered.

AN EXTREME CASE OF HATCHING ASYNCHRONY IN A PAIR OF TREE SWALLOWS

Tree Swallows (*Tachycineta bicolor*) typically lay 5-6 eggs, with one laid about every 24 hours (Winkler et al. 2011). Incubation typically lasts 14 days (range: 11-20 days), after which time the eggs all hatch within a 24-72-hour period (Zach 1982, Clotfelter et al. 2000, Winkler et al. 2011). I report a case of extreme hatching asynchrony by a pair of Tree Swallows.

One hundred and twenty-five nest boxes have been placed around the Chattanooga (Hamilton County) area in groups ranging from 10 to 25 boxes. The design and dimensions of the boxes followed those of standard bluebird (*Sialia spp.*) boxes (North American Bluebird Society 2007) and are mounted on metal poles, fences, or utility poles. All boxes were within 100 m of water, and are in or adjacent to open fields. Most of the boxes are also in close proximity to human activity (sidewalks, parking lots, trails, etc.). On 8 May 2017, a female laid the first egg of her clutch, and the 6-egg clutch was completed on 13 May 2017. On 25 May 2017, the first egg hatched. The nest was checked every two days, and no additional eggs hatched until 31 May 2017, at which time I observed a newly hatched chick, plus 4 unhatched eggs (Figure 1).

During the next nest check on 2 June 2017, the newly hatched chick was dead and none of the other eggs had hatched. The remaining chick was present on all subsequent checks until 10 June 2017, when it was no longer in the nest. As there was no evidence of predation, the chick is presumed to have fledged. In seven years of study of this population, this is the most extreme case of hatching asynchrony observed; all other broods have hatched within 48 hours (Aborn, unpublished data).

THE 2018 TENNESSEE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT SUMMARY

The 2018 Tennessee Christmas Bird Count (CBC) season was the 75th consecutive compilation of the count in Tennessee, and the 88th overall (no count was reported for 1943). Twenty-eight counts reported data this season. This year observers recorded 162 species and three count week species. The weather across the state was reasonably mild, with eight counts experiencing some light rain. Temperatures ranged from 27° F at Duck River to 65° F at Elizabethton.

Yellow-throated Vireo and Magnolia Warbler were new species for the state CBC, bringing the total species to 271 (plus four more count week only species). Other count highlights included Eurasian Wigeon, Common Ground-Dove, Ruffed Grouse, Whooping Crane, Iceland Gull (three recorded as Thayer's Gull), Red-throated and Pacific loons, American Bittern, Green Heron, Tree Swallow, Evening Grosbeak, Harris's Sparrow, Western Meadowlark, Baltimore Oriole, and Tennessee and Nashville warblers.

The following species were recorded in record or unusually high numbers for this compilation: Cackling Goose, Canvasback, Redhead, Greater Scaup, Common Goldeneye, Spotted Sandpiper, Herring Gull, White-breasted and Brown-headed nuthatches, Brown Thrasher, Lincoln's Sparrow, and Swamp Sparrow. Record low or notably low totals were recorded for American Black Duck, Northern Bobwhite, Eastern Screech-Owl, American Kestrel, American Crow, European Starling, American Tree Sparrow (first miss since 1979), and Brown-headed Cowbird.

Please note that count summaries are in alphabetical order; count compilations read from west to east.

COUNT SUMMARIES

BIG SANDY - BGSA (36.34050°, -88.082100°) - 16 December; no times given. Weather: clear; 34-50° F. The 115 species found this year was a new count record. Highlights included 31 species of water birds, Osprey, and Le Conte's Sparrow. DUCK RIVER - **DUCK** (35.53300°, -86.90000°) - 22 December; 0300-1715. Weather: early morning fog; 27-50° F. The 130 species was a new high total for a CBC in Tennessee. Gray Catbird was a new species for this count. Highlights included Eurasian Wigeon and Iceland Gull. 

THE FALL SEASON

1 August - 30 November 2018

The remnants of two tropical systems reached Tennessee this autumn. After hitting the Gulf coast, Tropical Storm Gordon moved thru West and Middle Tennessee with rain on 9 September, grounding a few shorebirds and terns, mainly at Duck River Unit.

Hurricane Florence made landfall near Wilmington, North Carolina on 14 September, then slowly churned westward through South Carolina before turning north across western North Carolina. The leading bands of rain from Florence moved into northeast Tennessee during the night of 15-16 September, with light rain continuing through the 17th. A major fallout of Common Terns occurred on 16 September, with large flocks found on seven lakes in the two eastern regions of the state. The combined total from these sites exceeded 1200 individuals, including 550 at South Holston Lake which established a new high count in the state. While this species is often a key component of hurricane-related fallouts, these numbers are unprecedented in Tennessee. Small numbers of Caspian and Black Terns occurred as well. A Parasitic Jaeger appeared on Douglas Lake with this system, and a Rednecked Phalarope was seen on Watauga Lake. Curiously, only one Laughing Gull, often the core species among hurricane-related fallouts, appeared with the terns.

A winter storm moved northeastward through the state on 14-15 November with rain and snow causing a fallout of loons and ducks. Unprecedented numbers of Common Loons were found in northeast Tennessee. The previous high count in the state for this species was exceeded twice, on two different lakes! Scoters appeared in several areas statewide at this time as well.

Numerous Neotropic migrants from a broad spectrum of species lingered later than normal this autumn, many well into November or beyond, especially in East Tennessee. Indeed, eight species established new late departure dates for the state: Common Tern, Eastern Wood-Pewee (see winter report), Philadelphia Vireo, Red-eyed Vireo, Northern Rough-winged Swallow, Blackburnian Warbler, Yellow Warbler, and Blackpoll Warbler. The number of Blackpoll Warblers in the two eastern regions was well above average for a species that is normally seldom seen in fall.

Notable rarities this season included Long-billed Curlew, Sabine's Gull, Brown Booby, and Swainson's Hawk in West Tennessee; Boat-tailed Grackle (first state record) and Western Tanager in Middle Tennessee; along with Say's Phoebe in East Tennessee. While regular in Shelby County, Western Kingbirds in Middle and East Tennessee were quite rare as well.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION - - Temperatures and precipitation across the region fell within normal ranges, with September being the outlier. That month saw temperatures nearly three degrees above normal and with rainfall over two inches greater than usual.

The period saw its share of unusual sightings. The biggest oddity was a really out-of-range Brown Booby in Shelby County that would furnish the second state and first county record, pending acceptance by the state records committee. Among the best of the rest were Black Scoters in Tipton and Shelby counties, Long-billed Curlews in Lake County, Red Phalaropes in Lake and Henry counties, Sabine's Gull in Henry County, and Swainson's Hawk in Lake County. A Common Ground-Dove in Shelby County was a nice find.

Irruptives made an early showing as feeder watchers throughout the region began reporting Red-breasted Nuthatches from mid-October through November, with Purple Finches and Pine Siskins appearing in November, and an American Tree Sparrow in Shelby County in mid-November.

HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION - - Weather this fall was generally hotter and wetter than normal. Temperatures were above normal each month from August through October, with September (+ 5.8 degrees) being the most extreme. November finally brought some cool weather, ending up 3.4 degrees below normal. Precipitation was above normal over the first two months by a combined 5.2 inches, while the latter two months received near normal amounts of rainfall.

Highlights this fall included a first state record of Boat-tailed Grackle that stayed long enough for many to observe. A month later the same site produced a Least Bittern that also stayed a while. Other great birds this fall included Red and Red-necked Phalarope, Black-legged Kittiwake, Wood Stork, Neotropic Cormorant, Roseate Spoonbill, Western Kingbird, and Western Tanager.

CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE and VALLEY REGION - - Summer's heat continued through September and the first ten days of October. In the Tri-cities the season's last 90 degree day was achieved on 7 October, setting a record late date for that temperature. The remainder of the period saw below normal temperatures. Rainfall for the season was above average, helping to make this the fourth wettest year on record in the Tri-cities area.

This year's abundant precipitation kept most of the upper tributary lake levels higher than normal well into the fall season. This included Douglas Lake, resulting in little shorebird habitat at Rankin Bottoms until mid-September. Shorebird diversity and numbers at Rankin were less than normal, with only 20 species, but still tops in the region. Shorebird highlights this season were a Marbled Godwit at Rankin Bottoms and a Red Knot in Hamilton County.

Two severe weather events caused major fallouts on regional lakes. First, the remnants of Hurricane Florence produced a fallout of Common Terns at several lakes on 16 September, along with a Parasitic Jaeger at Upper Douglas Lake. Two months later, a winter storm on 14-15 November caused a massive fallout of Common Loons. This latter storm also grounded 1200 ducks of 16 species on Boone Lake, a very large number for northeast Tennessee. Scoters appeared at several sites throughout the region following the same storm.

A Purple Gallinule observed in Kingsport was unusual as there are very few fall records in the state or sightings of immature birds. Common Gallinules were found at three sites, which is well above normal. Curiously, these were the only gallinules reported in the state. A Bonaparte's Gull on 19 August set a new early arrival date for the state. A Say's Phoebe in Bledsoe County was the first in East Tennessee and about the tenth in the state. A week later the same site produced a Western Kingbird, also quite rare in East Tennessee. Several rare sparrows were found, particularly in Knox County and vicinity. Blackpoll Warbler is normally quite rare during fall migration in Tennessee and often goes unreported at that season, but this autumn there were five regional reports, most supported by photos. A remarkable number of very late Neotropic migrants were noted this season, including

Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Common Tern, Eastern Wood-Pewee, Philadelphia Vireo, Tree Swallow, and several warblers; this despite temperatures slightly cooler than normal in November. Boreal irruptives were represented by widespread Red-breasted Nuthatches and moderate numbers of Purple Finches and Pine Siskins.

EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION - - Temperatures were above average for the period except for November, which was cooler than normal. September was especially warm. Precipitation was above normal for each month, with total rainfall for the period more than 5 inches above normal.

Separate storm systems caused fallouts of Common Terns and Common Loons on South Holston Lake, both of which set state records for highest number of individuals in a single day. Black-legged Kittiwake was another good find at South Holston Lake, as was a Rednecked Phalarope at Watauga Lake. Several warblers persisted later than normal, some into November.

Big Bald Mountain and Whigg Meadows continued their fall bird banding efforts as detailed below. Hawk banding was also conducted at Big Bald, while Northern Saw-whet Owls were banded at both stations. Clay-colored Sparrow and Mourning Warbler were new species banded at Whigg Meadows. Numbers of Blackpoll Warblers banded at Big Bald were much higher than normal.

- Big Bald Mountain, Unicoi County: 23 August into October (2427 birds of 65 species banded), Mark Hopey, head bander. Top species banded: Tennessee Warbler (608), Dark-eyed Junco (322), Black-throated Blue Warbler (305), Swainson's Thrush (304), and Bay-breasted Warbler (113).
- Whigg Meadows, Monroe County: 31 August 30 September (1200 birds of 45 species banded), Scott Rush, head bander. Top species banded: Tennessee Warbler (417), Swainson's Thrush (145), Black-throated Blue Warbler (120), Blue-headed Vireo (91), and Dark-eyed Junco (65).

• Big Bald Mountain hawk banding operation, Unicoi County: September and October (84 birds of 6 species banded), Mark Hopey, bander. Species banded: Sharp-shinned Hawk (63), Merlin (8), Cooper's Hawk (6), Red-tailed Hawk (4), Peregrine Falcon (2), and Northern Harrier (1).

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

The Migrant records observations and studies of birds in Tennessee and adjacent areas. SUBMISSIONS: The manuscript should be submitted electronically to Bob Ford at editorthemigrant@gmail.com. Submission of hard copies is optional. If so desired the original and two copies of the manuscript should be sent to the: Editor: Bob Ford, 808 Hatchie, Brownsville, TN 38012. Manuscripts that have been published in other journals should not be submitted.

MATERIAL: The subject matter should relate to some phase of Tennessee ornithology. It should be original, factual, concise and scientifically accurate.

STYLE: Both articles and short notes are solicited; recent issues of *The Migrant* should be used as a guide in the preparation of manuscripts. Where more detail is needed, reference should be made to *Scientific Style and Format*, eighth edition, by the Council of Science Editors, councilscienceeditors.org.

COPY: Manuscripts should be double-spaced with adequate margins for editorial notations and emailed in Word.docx. Tables and figures should be prepared in a separate file with appropriate headings; see *Scientific Style and Format* for examples of appropriate form for tables. Photographs intended for reproduction should be at least 300 dpi or sharp with good contrast on glossy white paper. Weights, measurements, and distances should be in metric units. Dates should be in "continental" form (e.g., 16 March 1997). Use the 24-hour clock (e.g., 0500 or 1900).

NOMENCLATURE: The scientific name of a species should be given after the first use of the full common name in the text. The scientific name should be italicized and in parentheses. Names should follow the *A. O. U. Check-list of North American Birds* (seventh edition, 1998, or supplements).

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific and descriptive.

ABSTRACT: Manuscripts of five or more pages should include an abstract. The abstract should be less then 5% of the length of the manuscript. It should include a brief explanation of why the research was done, the major results, and why the results are important.

LITERATURE CITED: List all literature citations in a "Literature Cited" section at the end of the text. Text citations should include the author and year.

IDENTIFICATION: Manuscripts including reports of rare or unusual species or of species at atypical times should include: date and time, light and weather conditions, exact location, habitat, optical equipment, distance, behavior of bird, comparison with other similar species, characteristic markings, experience of observer, other observers verifying the identification and reference works consulted.

REPRINTS: Reprints are available to authors on request. Billing to authors will be through the TOS treasurer. Request for reprints must be made well in advance of printing.

SEASON REPORTS: Observations that are to be considered for publication in "The Season" should be mailed to the appropriate Regional Compiler. Consult a recent issue of *The Migrant* for the name and address of the compiler.
