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SUMMARY OF BIRD WINDOW CASUALTIES ON THE UNIVERSITY OF TENNESSEE-CHATTANOOGA CAMPUS

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ABSTRACT

Collisions with windows are a major source of mortality for birds and are regarded as a serious threat to their populations. I have been monitoring bird casualties around 11 buildings on the campus of the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga for the past 20 years, documenting numbers of individuals and species killed or injured from striking windows. I have tallied 854 casualties comprising 76 species. Most casualties occur during migration, especially in the fall, and four buildings account for 90% of casualties. Common Yellowthroat was the most frequently detected species and accounted for nearly 10% of all casualties found.

INTRODUCTION

Each year, window collisions kill between 600 million and 1 billion birds in the United States (Klem 2006, 2009, Loss et al. 2014), and a large proportion of these birds are migrants. Migrating birds face numerous challenges during their journey, including finding enough food, avoiding predators, and seeking shelter from bad weather (Moore et al. 1995). Windows add an additional hazard to an already arduous journey, which accounts for a large portion of the annual mortality of migratory songbirds (Sillet and Holmes 2002). Most collisions occur because birds see the sky and vegetation reflected in the window and do not

realize it is an obstacle. In addition, many songbirds migrate at night, and can be attracted to the lights left on in buildings, resulting in more collisions (Ogden 1996). Thus, window collisions are a significant threat to bird populations in the United States and around the world (Loss et al. 2014). Not all buildings, however, have equal collision rates. Factors such as the height of the building, the number and size of windows, type of glass used, and types of landscaping around the buildings all influence the number of collisions (Hager et al. 2013, Cusa et al. 2015, Hager et al. 2017). In addition to having a lot of landscaping, many college campuses (hereafter referred to as campuses) are comprised of low-rise buildings (4-11 stories tall), and such buildings account for the majority of casualties (Loss et al. 2014). Thus, campuses can pose significant risks for birds (Blem and Willis 1998, Somerlot 2003, Borden et al. 2010, Ocampo-Peñuela et al. 2016, Elmhurst and Grady 2017, Schneider et al. 2018). I have been documenting window collisions along a regularly surveyed route on the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga (UTC) campus since 2000. I hope to use these results to persuade the UTC administration to adopt more bird-friendly building options in the future.

METHODS




Figure 1. Map of the UTC campus with the buildings surveyed highlighted.

The Chattanooga campus of the University of Tennessee (35.05° N,-85.30° W) is one of four campuses in the University of Tennessee system. It is approximately 1.2 km from downtown Chattanooga, and less than 0.5 km from the Tennessee River. The campus occupies approximately 53 ha, with over 2,000 individual trees and shrubs comprising 70 different woody plant species. Since January of 2000, I have been following a prescribed route on the UTC campus, 3-4 days per week, all year round. The route encompasses 11 buildings: Holt Hall, Grote Hall, the engineering building (EMCS), Fine Arts Center, the old Lupton Library (now Lupton Hall), Brock Hall, the new UTC Library, McLellan Hall, the University Center, West Campus Housing, and the campus fitness center (ARC) (Figure 1). All these buildings are 3-4 stories tall. The area of window space of each building and the amount of vegetation around the buildings varied (see photographs in Appendix I). When I arrive at each building, I walk around its perimeter looking for any casualties that are in plain sight. I do not look behind or under any bushes that might be around a given building. For any casualties I find, I record the date, species, building, and whether the bird is dead or temporarily stunned. Dead specimens are collected for the UTC Natural History Museum (Federal Salvage Permit MB074613-0, TN Salvage Permit 1727) unless ants or flies have degraded a given carcass. I use chi-square tests to compare the proportion of casualties at different buildings and in different seasons, as well as to compare the proportion of different species found.

RESULTS




Figure 2. Number of window casualties by month on the UTC campus, 2000-2020.

Between January 2000 and 31 December 2020, I have found 854 casualties comprising 74 species (Table 1). Of those, 82% were killed and 18% were stunned. Peak casualties occurred during migration, especially in the fall ($\chi^2 = 1,076.85$, df = 3, P < 0.0001; Figure 2). A disproportionate number of all casualties were long-distance migrants; species that breed in temperate and boreal regions of North America and migrate to Mexico, Central and South America and the Caribbean during the non-breeding season (Moore et al., 1995), (Long-distance migrants = 55%, Short-distance migrants = 23%, Residents = 22%; $\chi^2 = 232.55$, df = 2, P < 0.0001).




Figure 3. Proportions of window casualties at different buildings on the UTC campus,

A Chi-square test revealed that casualties were not evenly distributed among the buildings ($\chi^2 = 1,595.72$, df = 10, P < 0.0001). Since it opened in 2015, I have found most casualties around the new library, which is a large 4-story building with many windows on all sides (Figures 3-4). Holt Hall and University Center also have a high proportion of casualties.

The proportion of the different species found was also not evenly distributed (χ^2 = 1,698.38, df = 73, P < 0.0001). Common Yellowthroats (*Geothlipis trichas*) were the most common casualty, followed by Ovenbirds (*Sieurus aurocapilla*) and Hermit Thrushes (*Catharus guttatus*) (Figure 5).

UTC Window Casualties 2015-2020 (since New Library opened) n = 634




Figure 4. Proportions of window casualties at different buildings on the UTC campus since the new library opened, 2015-2020.

DISCUSSION

My numbers are likely an underrepresentation of avian window casualties on the UTC campus; I am not checking every day, not checking every building, and scavengers may remove carcasses before I find them. Kummer et al. (2016) found that over 67% of carcasses were scavenged, meaning there might have been as many 1,435 birds that have hit the buildings I check. The percentage of birds killed is like Klem et al. (2009; 85%), and higher than that reported by Gelb and Delacretaz (2009; 67%). The seasonal pattern of higher casualties during migration is also similar to other studies (Hager et al. 2008, Gelb and Delacretaz 2009, Borden et al. 2010). Unfortunately, UTC is not unique among college campuses. As noted earlier, many campuses possess features that increase the likelihood of collisions, such as low buildings and landscaped grounds. Additional features, such as proximity to water, might also increase a campus' attractiveness for birds, resulting in more collisions.

To further illustrate the impact of window collisions on bird populations, I have found two casualties that had US Geological Survey leg bands on them. These aluminum bands are individually numbered and are put on by researchers to monitor the movements and survival of individual birds. The first banded bird I found was a Gray Catbird (Dumatella carolinensis), and it had been killed by one of the windows at the UTC library on 27 September 2016. This bird had been banded at the Kalamazoo Nature Center in Michigan on 14 August 2016, and was aged as a hatch-year bird, meaning it hatched earlier that summer and was on its first migration. The second banded bird I have found was a female Hooded Warbler (Setophaga citrina), killed by one of the windows at the ARC on 4 May 2018. This bird had been banded in Belize on 9 April 2016. The bander determined it to be a second-year bird, meaning it hatched the previous year and was on its first spring migration after spending the winter in the tropics. This bird hatched somewhere in the eastern United States in 2015, survived the rigors of migration described in the Introduction, survived the winter, migrated north where it presumably bred in 2016, flew south again that fall, wintered, flew north and bred again in 2017, wintered in the tropics again, and finally met its demise at the ARC flying north to breed a third time. These two birds, along with the other birds I have found, represent a loss of reproductive potential and genetic variability, which may be detrimental to their respective populations. In addition, while I am not trying to anthropomorphize those banded birds, they nonetheless have stories and may help put a "face" to the hazard windows pose. This, in turn, might motivate the University of Tennessee administration, as well as the public, to take the necessary measures to mitigate the problem.

While it might seem unfeasible to retrofit the existing windows, there are relatively inexpensive options for reducing window collisions on the UTC campus, and certainly any new construction or renovation of existing buildings should incorporate bird-friendly components. Potential solutions to window collisions include UV coatings, 1-way colloidal films, fritted glass, and window screens. Of these, UV coatings and colloidal films provide the best solution, as they reduce collisions (Klem and Saenger 2013, Sheppard 2019), but do not interfere with the transmission of sunlight or people's ability to see out the windows. Hanging lines of parachute cord strung vertically 9-11 cm apart has also been shown to be

effective in reducing collisions (Klem and Saenger 2013) and might be more cost effective than window coatings or films but may prove difficult to accomplish on buildings with many windows. I hope to test different options to see which has the greatest reduction in collisions, as well as which option has the greatest appeal to students, faculty, and staff. Another partial solution would be to turn off all unnecessary lights at night. Not only would this help reduce window collisions, but it would also save the University money by reducing electricity costs. I also hope to determine why UTC has such a high proportion of Common Yellowthroat casualties, and why certain buildings have more casualties of certain species (e.g., most Ruby-throated Hummingbird and Song Sparrow casualties come from Holt Hall). Yellowthroats, Ovenbirds, and hummingbirds were also common casualties at Virginia Commonwealth University, but no explanation was given as to why those species might have been so prevalent (Blem and Willis 1998). The species I most commonly find tend to forage low, making them more vulnerable to hitting windows, but it does not explain specifically what it is about the UTC campus that is attractive to those species, especially yellowthroats.

I hope my results, in combination with a student-led awareness campaign, will persuade the UTC administration, and possibly the whole University of Tennessee system, to adopt bird-friendly building practices in the future

THE 2020 TENNESSEE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT SUMMARY

This Tennessee Christmas Bird Count (CBC) season was like no other in our history. The coronavirus pandemic was raging at its most lethal period, right before vaccinations started, when the CBC counts were run. The Tennessee Ornithology Society wants to thank all the observers who safely ventured out during the pandemic to record bird data.

This was the 77th consecutive compilation of CBC's in Tennessee (begun in 1930), and the 90th overall (no count was reported for 1943). Twenty-eight counts reported data this season. This represented 154 species, plus 4 count week species. The weather across the state was reasonably normal with some counts having light rain and windy conditions. The Duck River CBC had horrible weather. Temperatures ranged from a chilly 12° in Perry Couny to a comfortable 63° in Knoxville.

American Avocet and Cassin's Kingbird were new species for the state CBC, bringing the total species to 274 (+ 3 count week). Surf Scoter, Long-tailed Duck, Yellow-crowned Night-Heron, Long-eared Owl, Northern Saw-whet Owl, Spotted Towhee. Grasshopper Sparrow, and Black-and-white Warbler were other notable sightings.

The following species were recorded in record or unusually high numbers for this compilation: Ring-billed Gull, Herring Gull, Forster's Tern, American White Pelican, Barn Owl (3rd highest), Eastern Phoebe, Common Raven, Brown-headed Nuthatch, House Wren, Winter Wren, Hermit Thrush, Gray Catbird, Brown Thrasher, Orange-crowned Warbler, Palm Warbler, and Indigo Bunting. Record low or notably low totals were recorded for Ruddy Duck (lowest in 24 years), Northern Bobwhite (lowest ever and a continuing downward trend), Ruffed Grouse (first count period miss in 45 years), American Coot (lowest in 48 years), Belted Kingfisher (lowest in 39 years), Horned Lark (lowest in 38 years), and Field Sparrow (lowest in 32 years). What are called the irruptive finches (including Reb-breasted Nuthatch) had a banner year. Red-breasted Nuthatch (highest in 19 years), Evening Grosbeak (highest in 23 years), Purple Finch (highest in 31 years), Red Crossbill (about average), and Pine Siskin (highest in 12 years) were all found in much higher numbers this year. The hours recorded on foot was also the highest in the past 20 years.

Please note that count summaries are in alphabetical order; count compilations read from west to east.

COUNT SUMMARIES

MINUTES OF THE 2020 FALL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

11 November 2020

The Board of Directors meeting was held 11 November and called to order at 6:35 pm by President Danny Gaddy. Due to covid restrictions the meeting was held via Zoom. Secretary Cyndi Routledge determined there was a quorum. Minutes of the Spring meeting were approved as corrected.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS

TREASURER: Pam Lasley reported the assets the Society at the end of 2019 were \$400,241 including cash of \$2,864, and fair market value of our Vanguard investments at \$397,227. The year saw our investments experience a net increase of \$55,046 which includes a \$5,000 transfer to operating checking. Further information includes:

- Non-investment revenue for the year was \$11,865 for dues and subscriptions and \$560 from contributions. Total expenses were \$25,426. In total, revenues over expenses were \$47,045.
- Publications and communications at \$12,766 are our largest expense and includes four issues of *The Migrant*, three issues of *The Warbler*, and maintenance of our old website. Cost of insurance was the same as last year at \$997.
- A total of \$10,818 was awarded in Research and Conservation grants. Included in those grants was \$1,500 to Dauphin Island Bird Sanctuary for vital migratory bird habitat. This reduced our Conservation and Research Restricted fund to \$16,951. Insurance was the same as last year at \$997. In total revenues over expenses were \$47,045.
- For 2019 dividends and interest were \$11,990, but our assets increased in market value by \$48,055. In 2019, we distributed \$5,000 to our operating cash account for the year. Our current rate of return on our investments is in the 8% range for 10- and 5-year annualized return with 1- and 3-year rates averaging at 7.6%. The portfolio remains defensively structured for any upcoming market volatility with approximately 47% in equity positions.
- Total membership and subscriptions were up slightly, by eleven members. Memberships for 2019 were 639as compared to 630 in 2018.
- As required by the Constitution, an examination of the 2019 financial records was performed. Since there is no Finance Committee in place, and in consultation with the President, Betty Bailey of the Kingsport chapter to perform this exam. She submitted her report to the president indicating a clean exam.

Pam Lasley clarified other financial transactions:

• In September, the Executive Committee voted to support the Swan Conservation Trust in a grant application for purchase of 140 acres in Lewis County, adding to their 1358-acre Big Swan Headwaters Preserve. If their NAWCA grant is approved, we will donate \$5000 in matching funds in each of 2021 and 2022 towards protecting this wetland area.

A motion was made to accept the Financial report as written and presented; this passed unanimously.

The Migrant: Editor Bob Ford reported that all issues are available on the website SORA. Each current year can be found on the TOS webpage

CURATOR: President Gaddy announced that Chuck Nicolson will step down in April 2021, and Stefan Woltmann will take over the position.

NEW BUSINESS

Cyndi Routledge reported that the new website was launched on 4 March 2020. Dick Preston presented a proposal by Amy Wilms for a yearly maintenance contract for the webpage to be reviewed and renewed annually. Mac McWhirter moved to approve the contract; this passed unanimously

President Danny Gaddy announced that Dr. Michael Collins, Memphis Chapter, has agreed to serve as the next President of TOS. Melinda Welton made the motion for his nomination; Chris Welsh seconded. Passed unanimously.

President Gaddy stated that after a discussion with Michael Collins regarding technical logistics and the ongoing pandemic, and with approval of the Board of Directors, Dr. Collins has agreed to begin his tenure as the next President on 1 January 2021 instead of waiting till April 2021. Dick Preston made this motion, as a one-time exception to the normal installation of officers, due to extenuating circumstances of the pandemic. All other officers and committee chairs will be installed at the regular annual meeting in the spring. Mac McWhirter seconded. Passed unanimously


Pam Lasley made motion to adjourn the virtual meeting. Mac McWhirter seconded.

THE FALL SEASON

1 August - 30 November 2020

The challenges of this year's coronavirus crisis continued through autumn with no end in sight, yet birders were able to monitor the fall migration safely and effectively as it progressed from month to month. Good showings by some migrants may have been related to birders being able to spend more time in the field.

This year was one of the most active on record for tropical cyclones in the Atlantic basin, and five of these systems had some impact on Tennessee. However, only one tropical system caused a notable fallout here. Hurricane Laura, a Category 4 storm, hit the southwest Louisiana coast and moved inland as far as southern Missouri. As the remnant low turned eastward and moved across Kentucky, it brought locally heavy rains and gusty winds sweeping across Tennessee on 28-29 August. This produced a fallout of coastal and pelagic seabirds, highlighted by Pomarine Jaeger, Sooty and Royal Terns, Band-rumped Storm-Petrel, and Red-necked Phalarope. Pickwick Lake hosted the majority of this bounty despite being farther from the storm track than other water bodies to the north. Surprisingly few Laughing Gulls were in this fallout. This system also grounded numerous Black Terns and some other terns and shorebirds which may have been south-bound migrants.

The next two tropical systems passed well to the south of Tennessee after hitting the central Gulf coast. Remnants of Hurricane Sally produced light rain overnight and into 17 September in far eastern Tennessee, grounding a few Common Terns in the northeast corner of the state. A week later moderate rain associated with remnants of Hurricane Beta fell across Tennessee from west to east during 23-25 September. A Magnificent Frigatebird at Paris Landing State Park was likely related to this system, as were a few terns at South Holston Lake.

The last two systems had little avian influence in the state. Hurricane Delta hit the Louisiana coast on 9 October, with its remnants passing through southern Tennessee shortly thereafter, but with no associated storm waifs found in Tennessee. A Magnificent Frigatebird in Middle Tennessee on 18 October and 7 November was likely a wanderer after the passage of one of the earlier systems. Hurricane Zeta made landfall in hard-hit Louisiana in the afternoon of 28 October then raced inland, passing just east of the Tennessee / North Carolina border in mid-morning on the 29th with heavy rain and blustery winds

throughout East Tennessee. Despite this proximity, few storm birds were found, albeit with a Royal Tern and some Laughing Gulls in Polk County.

Waterfowl numbers were rather lackluster this autumn; however, more than 20 reports of scoters statewide was a good total, including two reports of Black Scoter that exceeded the previous high count in the state. Shorebird numbers and diversity were near normal. Songbird migration seemed to be strong, at least by recent standards. Boreal irruptives staged a good flight consisting of numerous Red-breasted Nuthatches, Purple Finches, and Pine Siskins, while 15 reports of Evening Grosbeaks scattered across all four regions were the most in many years. Rarities were many, including Common Ground Dove, Whitewinged Dove, Anna's Hummingbird, Allen's Hummingbird (two regions), Sabine's Gull (four reports in two regions), Great Black-backed Gull, Brown Booby (two regions), Roseate Spoonbill, Swainson's Hawk, Long-eared Owl, Western Kingbird (especially two reports in East Tennessee), Ash-throated Flycatcher, Say's Phoebe, and Black-headed Grosbeak. Many more notable sightings are packed into the regional reports that follow.

Because many observations are now documented by photos on eBird, use of the word "photo" in the species accounts usually indicates presence of such on this web source. Any photos not on eBird have been confirmed by the regional compiler and / or Season editor.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION - - Temperatures and precipitation across the region were within historic norms, except for rainfall during August at nearly 4 inches above normal.

The continuing COVID-19 pandemic did little to dampen the enthusiasm of area birders, who recorded more than the usual number of rarities. Among them, a Black-headed Grosbeak spent a week at a feeder in Fayette County. An adult female Rufous Hummingbird was banded in Haywood County, and a Magnificent Frigatebird visited Henry County, as did a Great Black-backed Gull. Lake County produced a Common Ground Dove, a Swainson's Hawk, two Sooty Terns, two Sabine's Gulls and two Cave Swallows. All three scoters appeared in a single day at a small lake in Shelby County, and a single Surf Scoter was a great find in Fayette County. A Brown Booby meandered between Benton and Humphreys Counties on Kentucky Lake.

HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION - - Autumn weather in Middle Tennessee averaged warmer than normal. Temperatures from August through October were 1-2 degrees above normal, while November temperatures were 4 degrees above normal. Rainfall amounts were generally above normal, too, except for the final month of the season. August was the wettest at 2.7 inches above normal, while November was 3.1 inches below normal.

Because of an active hurricane season and poor cone production in Canada the fall season was an interesting time for regional birders. Pomarine Jaeger, Royal and Sooty Terns, Band-rumped Storm-Petrel, and two sightings of Magnificent Frigatebird were hurricane related. The start of an irruption year in much of the state began this fall with Red-breasted Nuthatch, Purple Finch, Pine Siskin, and Evening Grosbeak being reported. Other notables this fall included Eared Grebe, Allen's Hummingbird, Sabine's Gull, Roseate Spoonbill, Ashthroated Flycatcher, Say's Phoebe, Bell's Vireo, and Nelson's Sparrow.

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CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE and VALLEY REGION - - Temperatures overall were above average for the season. Rainfall was above average each month except for August which was slightly below average.

The water levels in Douglas Lake remained high much later than normal this year, and the extensive mud flats at Rankin Bottoms were not exposed until early October. Consequently, only 14 species of shorebirds and low overall numbers were seen at this traditional migration staging site. Other areas, mainly south of Knox County, produced a good list of shorebirds. However, the Tri-cities area had little shorebird habitat this season.

Numerous rarities were found this fall, highlighted by the region's first Brown Booby, Neotropic Cormorant, and Anna's Hummingbird. Also notable were Red-necked Grebe, Allen's Hummingbird, Franklin's Gull, Brown Pelican, Roseate Spoonbill, Northern Sawwhet Owl, Western Kingbird, and Clay-colored Sparrow. The warbler flight was good. Boreal irruptives were well represented, including five reports of Evening Grosbeaks and a Red Crossbill. Given the generally mild temperatures, it's not surprising that several Neotropical migrants lingered later than normal, a continuing trend in this time of climate change.

A banding station was operated at Greenway Farm in Hamilton County by David Aborn for the 18th year. Banding was conducted on 24 days between 18 August and 5 November with 212 birds of 30 species banded. The top five species banded were Wood Thrush (28), Swainson's Thrush (26), Hooded Warbler (23), Gray Catbird (20), and Gray-cheeked Thrush (20). All three thrushes in this list were banded in record high numbers.

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EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION - - Temperatures were above normal for all four months, and precipitation was slightly above normal for the period. Notable sightings included White-winged Scoter, Long-tailed Duck, Rufous Hummingbird, Laughing Gull, and Royal Tern. Boreal irruptives staged a good flight, including the most Evening Grosbeaks seen in many years.

Bird banding operations were conducted at three sites: Big Bald Mountain, Whigg Meadow, and Holston Valley. In addition to songbirds, raptors and Northern Saw-whet Owls were banded at Big Bald Mountain, with a high number of 34 saw-whets banded. Most were during late fall migration except for two nestlings banded during the summer. Also encountered at Big Bald was a saw-whet originally banded in northern Michigan in 2019. Eight Blackpoll Warblers were banded at Big Bald, which is a high number. A Mourning Warbler was a rare catch at the Holston Valley banding station.

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

The Migrant records observations and studies of birds in Tennessee and adjacent areas.

SUBMISSIONS: The manuscript should be submitted electronically to Bob Ford at editorthemigrant@gmail.com. Submission of hard copies is optional. If so desired the original and two copies of the manuscript should be sent to the: Editor: Bob Ford, 808 Hatchie, Brownsville, TN 38012. Manuscripts that have been published in other journals should not be submitted.

MATERIAL: The subject matter should relate to some phase of Tennessee ornithology. It should be original, factual, concise and scientifically accurate.

STYLE: Both articles and short notes are solicited; recent issues of *The Migrant* should be used as a guide in the preparation of manuscripts. Where more detail is needed, reference should be made to *Scientific Style and Format*, eighth edition, by the Council of Science Editors, councilscienceeditors.org.

COPY: Manuscripts should be double-spaced with adequate margins for editorial notations and emailed in Word.docx. Tables and figures should be prepared in a separate file with appropriate headings; see *Scientific Style and Format* for examples of appropriate form for tables. Photographs intended for reproduction should be at least 300 dpi or sharp with good contrast on glossy white paper. Weights, measurements, and distances should be in metric units. Dates should be in "continental" form (e.g., 16 March 1997). Use the 24-hour clock (e.g., 0500 or 1900).

NOMENCLATURE: The scientific name of a species should be given after the first use of the full common name in the text. The scientific name should be italicized and in parentheses. Names should follow the *A. O. U. Check-list of North American Birds* (seventh edition, 1998, or supplements).

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific and descriptive.

ABSTRACT: Manuscripts of five or more pages should include an abstract. The abstract should be less then 5% of the length of the manuscript. It should include a brief explanation of why the research was done, the major results, and why the results are important.

LITERATURE CITED: List all literature citations in a "Literature Cited" section at the end of the text. Text citations should include the author and year.

IDENTIFICATION: Manuscripts including reports of rare or unusual species or of species at atypical times should include: date and time, light and weather conditions, exact location, habitat, optical equipment, distance, behavior of bird, comparison with other similar species, characteristic markings, experience of observer, other observers verifying the identification and reference works consulted.

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
