FEBRUARY PROGRAM

The February program was presented by MTOS member Cathy Justis. Cathy has an M.S. in Aquatic Ecology and is Director of Education for the Wolf River Conservancy. She has over 25 years of experience in environmental education. Cathy provides education programs for K-12 students, leads a variety of nature walks, service projects, and teacher workshops and coordinates the Conservancy's webinar series. She is also involved in developing and managing the Conservancy website and editing its publications.

Cathy gave a broad overview of the Wolf River Conservancy activities. The Conservancy is dedicated to protection and enhancement of the Wolf River and its watershed as a sustainable natural resource. The Conservancy has 10 staff members. Cathy highlighted the activities of Ryan Hall, the Director of Land Conservation, and Findley Frazer, the Greenway Project Coordinator. She noted that the Conservancy has been heavily focused for many years on the Greenway project and that it should be completed in 5 years. The Wolf River Greenway is a protected corridor of greenspace along the Wolf River with a 12 foot wide pathway. The Greenway project is a partnership between the Wolf River Conservancy, Memphis Parks, and Shelby County. When complete it will run from the north end of Mud Island to Collierville. Currently 14 miles of the planned 26-mile corridor are open to the public. The Greenway provides recreational opportunities for bikers, hikers and bird watchers and ties together communities throughout Shelby County.

The Wolf River Conservancy was established in 1985 as a land trust to protect lands along the river as a public natural resource. Land trusts work with landowners and the community to conserve land by accepting donations of land, purchasing land, negotiating private, voluntary conservation agreements on land, and stewarding conserved land through generations to come. Cathy noted that in 2015 the Wolf River Conservancy was accredited by the Land Trust Alliance. This accreditation assures landowners and donors that their contributions will be properly protected. She noted the importance of the Wolf River watershed as a recharge source for the Memphis Sand Aquifer that provides Memphis with some of the best drinking water in the world. Ryan Hall has been evaluating lands along the river that are most critical to the goal of protecting a sustainable water source and natural habitat corridor for plants and wildlife. He has a goal of protecting 30 additional parcels of land by 2030. To date the Conservancy has assisted in protecting over 20,000 acres. The crown jewel of these protected lands is the Ghost River State Natural Area. In 1995, paddlers, conservationists, and nature enthusiasts came together to protect this section of the river that meanders through a swamp of cypress and water tupelo trees. The river serves as a haven for birds, fish, and other wildlife, as well a recreational opportunity for canoers and kayakers.

The Conservancy's educational and recreational programs will help to ensure the long-term success of its mission.

Treasurer's Report

As of February 21, 2024 the balance in the Treasury is \$15,800.00. The Annual Financial Statement for 2023 was prepared in January and audited in February. Highlights are as follows:

Revenue: \$5,486.51 in chapter dues, \$1,467.51 in donations, and \$352.00 in Auction receipts. PayPal fees (\$1.29 for Family dues, \$1.21 for Individual dues) account for "odd-looking" revenue subtotals.

Spending: \$3,677.12 on conservation projects led by MTOS or by partner groups, such as the Mid-South Raptor Center, Delta Wind Birds, and Hatchie National Wildlife Refuge. Expenditures also include \$3,052 of chapter dues remitted to TOS.

The ending MTOS balance as of December 31, 2023 was \$14, 648.31.

New Business

At the February 21 chapter meeting, Treasurer Barbara Pyles made a motion, seconded by David Hill, for the chapter to provide a \$600 Honorarium to St. George's Episcopal Church, for furnishing meeting space to MTOS for the 2023-2024 year. This motion will be voted on at the April 17 monthly meeting.

The Silent Auction that is usually held in March will not be held that night. A later date in 2024 is being planned.
