DECEMBER PROGRAM

Chapter member Allen Sparks presented *Elements of Compelling Wildlife Images* at the December meeting.

Allen has been teaching photography classes for 12 years and is especially interested in photographing animal behavior. He often sits for hours waiting to get the right shot of a particular species. He observes animal behavior and knows where to go to get images of a particular species. He plans where and when to photograph with certain elements of composition in mind.

Some of the elements Allen recommends for more interesting images include complimentary backgrounds, reflections, early or late light, environmental elements, young animals, interactions, and flight. His images often tell a story. Allen showed many beautiful images to illustrate the use of these elements. His intentional selection of a backgrounds was quite impressive. He mentioned seeing a field of sunflowers and predicting the presence of dickcissels. He set out to get an image of a dickcissel complemented by a

diffuse yellow background created by out-of-focus flowers. He showed several images of herons against a green water background that he selected to complement the bird's color or provide more subtle lighting. He also showed images with interesting environmental elements to complement a bird such as a heron against a background of colorful reeds and a wild turkey displaying in a field of small white flowers. He showed images of fox kits taken in a field behind his home. He said he waited to photograph the foxes until the field was mowed knowing that the shorter grass was needed to allow good images of the young foxes.

Allen noted that capturing reflections of birds in water requires focusing on the bird not on the reflection and being careful to include all the reflection. He uses specialized techniques such as a macro lens and fill flash



to get the true colors of dragonfly wings. He often uses eye-tracking photographic equipment to keep birds in focus in flight. He especially likes to capture birds banking in flight. He showed a great image of a banking Roseate Spoonbill with all the feathers of both wings and the tail fully displayed. Allen uses specialized camera equipment but we all can improve our images by incorporating some of these elements.

Treasurer Barbara Pyles reminded us to report any hummingbirds seen from Nov. 15 to March 15 to Cyndi Routledge.

Chapter President Liz Hall announced that Lichterman Nature Center would like to have TOS represented at their Birds and Seeds event. Volunteers are needed to man a table at the event answering questions about TOS and birds. The Chapter has a tabletop display and a membership brochure that can be used. Conservation

Dick Preston noted that during its fall banding sessions Delta Wind Birds has now captured a total of 125 shorebirds, and placed 54 Motus radio tags, as well as 15 Druid Bluetooth tags that give continuous GPS location data, tracking bird movements to the nearest 10 meters. TOS and individual members have supported these efforts.

Van Harris noted two conservation success stories. The status of the Redcockaded Woodpecker has been upgraded from endangered to threatened. The Guam Kingfisher that almost went extinct due to an introduced tree snake has been kept alive in captive breeding programs and was recently released on predator-free Palmyra Atoll.




