
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Dear CTOS Member,

#### What Have Your Seen?

#### April 11

At Enterprise South Nature Park this morning there were 2 Blue-winged Warblers. Other migrants there were Blue-gray Gnatcatchers, Red-eyed Vireos, Yellow-throated Vireos, a White-eyed Vireo, and a Prairie Warbler.

April 10 Bill Haley reported hearing a FOS Wood Thrush in his yard in Soddy Daisy. He also reported hearing a Chuck Wills Widow the previous evening.

#### April 6

Yesterday, April 6, I noted my first Ruby-throated Hummingbird of the year on my home prop-

erty in Birchwood (Hamilton County). This male showed up at a hummingbird feeder in early afternoon. Another highlight of the day was the sighting of two Hairy Woodpeckers, also at my property. Hairy Woodpecker sightings are infrequent for me anywhere around Birchwood. These two responded to a sound recording of their "peek" call followed by their "whinny" call on the iBird Pro phone app. Also on April 6 at home, I observed the most richly colored male White-throated Sparrow I have ever seen. I still have a few of these sparrows



around, but most seem to have already started their migration north to their nesting grounds.

#### April 6

Four female Brewer's Blackbirds are feeding on the ground around the Cattle Farm Buildings. Check both sides of Snow Hill Road and the trees around the Cattle Farm Buildings. April 5—This afternoon there was a Cattle Egret feeding at a small farm pond along Snow Hill Road. Location 9559-9569 Snow Hill Road.—35.11.49 N 85.1.49 W Ooltewah TN -Bruce Dralle

April 7—Charles, your update prompted me to write! I had not had hairy woodpeckers come to my house's birdfeeders for many years, but this winter a male and female have been visiting regularly. In the past, their visits were very infrequent; one might show up every two or three years. Now I see one or the other of them several days a week. The only thing I did differently this year was to add a new feeder, one that offers a big log of compressed food. That's the feeder they usually choose.

April 2—At the wetland off Curtain Pole Rd. in Chattanooga there is a male Blue-winged Teal. - David Aborn

March 31—The East Tennessee Nursery/Tree Farm is closed to - all traffic until 5 pm on weekdays. Pedestrian and bike access is allowed from 5-8 pm weekdays and all day weekends. Gee Creek campground is closed. I do not know if you are allowed to walk-in to the camping area. So far the Forest Service roads at Chilhowee and Thunder Rock remain open. - Rick Houlk

April 1— Around noon today I found a male Brewer's Blackbird on Pineville Road. The Brewer's was feeding in the short grass next to the brown brick building.

The location of the brown brick building is right at the railroad tracks. This is the same location where the Upland Sandpiper was seen last May. 817 Pineville Road. - Bruce Dralle
