DECEMBER FIELD TRIPS AND BIRD COUNTS

This area had several Christmas Bird Counts but the numbers and rare species have not been totaled yet. Look for these in the February newsletter.

December 27: Three members joined Ray Zimmer for the visit to Hiwassee Refuge and Sandhill Crane viewing. Two brought scopes, and several photographers were present. Ray listened to the cranes with a parabolic microphone, but did not record them since he have already made several audio recordings at this location.

Official figures say that 1,500 cranes were present that day, though Ray's estimate was somewhat lower at 1,000. Other species encountered included Bald Eagles, one adult and one immature. A lone Great Blue Heron stood in the slough. The most common ducks were Canvasbacks, Northern Shovelers, American Widgeons, and Ring-necked Ducks.

PROFILE: DAVID STONE

David moved to Ooltewah in 1982 to become the superintendent of The Honors Golf Course. Here is how he became interested in birds: "Shorly after it opened in 1983, a CTOS member gave the Honors Course ten Sawyer Bluebird houses. A year or so later another member and avid birder (Jonnie Sue Lyons - also a Chattanooga TOS member) asked me if I was cleaning out the houses after each nesting. I did not know they ever needed to be cleaned out, but we started doing it. In 1989, we discovered that one of the Bluebird nest contained a dead nestling but two more nestlings still alive. After a day of watching and seeing no parent feed them, we took them in and hand raised them. The next year, we were brought some other species of nestlings or birds that had experienced mishaps and we hand raised them, also, Almost all were successful and able to be released. After a couple of weeks outside most stopped coming back to be fed. One of the Bluebirds did come back and would eat out of my hand from the time we released him in the spring until spring the next year.

From that point on, I always tried to create habitat that would benefit the most birds. In 1991, The Honors Course received the first award given by the USGA for golf courses which created habitat for birds. A few years later, I was asked to do a program at a Chattanooga TOS monthly meeting. After that I started attending meetings occasionally. In the late 90's, Ken Dubke talked me into becoming a board member. As they say, the rest is history. I am a Past President and have been the Program Chairman more years than I want to remember!"
